March 3, 2022, 2:00pm- **Eleven Kotzebue** residents tested positive for COVID-19 on February 28, 2022 in Kotzebue. Some have mild symptoms, while some are asymptomatic, linked to known positive COVID-19 case, and community spread. They are in isolation in Kotzebue

Two Noorvik residents tested positive for COVID-19 on February 28, 2022 in Ambler. The individual is asymptomatic and linked to known positive COVID-19 case. They are in isolation in Ambler.

A Buckland resident tested positive for COVID-19 on February 28, 2022 in Ambler. The individual is asymptomatic and linked to known positive COVID-19 case. They are in isolation in Ambler.

A non-resident tested positive for COVID-19 on February 28, 2022 in Kotzebue. The individual is asymptomatic and not linked to known positive COVID-19 case. They are in isolation in Kotzebue.

Two Kiana residents tested positive for COVID-19 on March 1, 2022 in Kiana. One has mild symptoms, while the other is asymptomatic, linked to known positive COVID-19 case, and community spread. They are in isolation in Kiana.

An Ambler resident tested positive for COVID-19 on March 2, 2022 in Ambler. The individual has mild symptoms and not linked to known positive COVID-19 case. They are in isolation in Ambler.

A non-resident tested positive for COVID-19 on March 2, 2022 in Kotzebue. The individual is asymptomatic and not linked to known positive COVID-19 case. They are in isolation in Kotzebue.

A Deering resident tested positive for COVID-19 on March 2, 2022 in Deering. The individual has mild symptoms and not linked to known positive COVID-19 case. They are in isolation in Deering.

While some communities throughout the Maniilaq service area may not have *known* active positive COVID-19 cases currently, it is important to continue to stay vigilant and follow recommended preventative measures.

We need your help in slowing the spread. We all play a part in keeping our loved ones safe. **The power of simple tools such as getting vaccinated, social distancing, avoiding gatherings, wearing a mask and hand washing make a difference.**

Maniilaq Public Health Nursing is working with the State to conduct contact tracing and will reach out to anyone who may have come into significant contact with these cases. If residents believe they have been exposed to COVID-19 and develop a fever and symptoms, such as a dry cough or difficulty breathing, call your healthcare provider for medical advice or call Maniilaq's COVID-19 Hotline at 833-442-7015. The following symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure:

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle pain or body aches
- Headache
- Sore throat
- New loss of taste or smell
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

Please follow the health mandates put in place by your community. It is important you are not actively out in the community during the quarantine period put in place by your community.
